Tishomingo Ice Floes

Where were you, Friday morning, February 20th? Did you see the break up of the ice floes? It was quite a spectacle. I hadn't realized that the ice was as thick as it was, nor as powerful. I have witnessed the power of wind and water as my husband and I sailed off the coast of the New England in gale force winds, so I have a deep respect for the power of the ocean and the force of the wind. But I had never before seen firsthand, the power of ice floes.

I happened to glance out the

window, that Friday morning, and noticed that large sheets of ice were being pushed east by strong winds, up the lake. I found it interesting, but not alarming. Later I mentioned to my husband that he might want to see what was happening to the ice. Just as we both looked out the window again, a huge flat ice floe met a (hopefully) immovable object . . . our boat and the dock it was tied to. All at once the boat started straining at the lines, and pushing eastward. The ice crunched and forced itself into and under the boat pontoons. You could see the dock shuddering. My husband

said, "We could loose our boat and the dock . . .look at that ice." There was nothing we could do. It seems that we stood watching a long time, but actually it was no more than a minute or two, before the ice actually started pivoting around the boat, releasing the pressure. Smaller pieces of ice broke loose and floated free between the pontoons. The entire ice floe, which covered half the width of the lake, released itself and spun slowly in a counter clockwise direction, away from the dock and

seawall. Then large cracks formed across and down the ice sheet. Slowly it moved eastward and damage was avoided. Then I wondered what would happen after the wind changed its direction and the ice came back down the lake. Hopefully by that time it would be broken up into smaller and less dangerous pieces.

I now have a new respect for the power of ice. Hope everyone's docks and boats survived the break-up of the ice floes. Here's to spring . . . with just the wind to contend with. Tighten those lines and get ready!



Letters to the Editor

An open letter to the Lake Tishomingo community

My name is Rick Hannick, and, as most of you know, I served on the LTPOA Board of Directors for six years, five as president. My first year on the board, I served as building director. I spent a lot of time talking to various property owners and past board members in an effort to learn how the board operated, but more importantly, what the major concerns of the property owners were. At the start of my second year, I was chosen by the elected board members as president, and remained in that position for the next five years. The most pressing need at that time was the total reconstruction of the spillway. There was a very real probability of the spillway walls totally washing out, which would have put our entire dam in jeopardy of failing. We put a plan in place to repair the entire spillway, funded by a special 2-year assessment. That repair was accomplished at a cost of approximately \$80,000, which was \$25,000 under budget. The balance of the proceeds from that special assessment were rolled into a special projects fund as seed money for the road and silt projects.

In 1998 the board published a survey asking the property owners what their priorities were concerning the improvements needed within our community. The order of priorities from that survey were: roads, sewers, silt, security gate. Based on that survey, the board set out to make those things happen. With the exception of sewers, it was determined that the other three were attainable. The security gate was paid for from surpluses in the general assessment budget. The road and silt projects were a totally different funding level. The original estimate for the road project was \$225,000 (which turned out to be unrealistic), and \$275,000 for the silt project, with a five year completion (which also proved to be unrealistic). The next set of numbers that the board considered were \$325,000 for the roads, and the same \$275,000 for the silt. Using these numbers, we went to Eagle Bank and discussed an interest-only loan to fund these projects over a five year life, with principal payback to begin in 2003. Using Eagle banks numbers, and our own projections of the cash flow through 2003, it was decided that we could accomplish both projects by initiating a \$450,000 loan to be funded with the \$1.00 permanent assessment increase. When this proposal was presented to the property owners, it was overwhelmingly supported, with the exception of the people on the cove roads who felt that they were being shortchanged. The board then decided to commit an additional \$79,000 to pave the cove roads at the same time the main roads were done. This additional money was projected to create a financial crunch, primarily in 2004. Based on the original projection of a five year duration for the silt project, that project was expected to be winding down in 2003, and wrapping up in 2004. Obviously, that didn't happen, and we find ourselves in our current financial corner. The board originally thought that when the silt project was completed, it would become a revenue source to help pay back the loan, either by selling the dredge outright, or leasing it to other lake communities. This may still happen, but it's not going to be for at least the next two or three years, if then.

During the six years I spent on the board, I had the privilege of working with 19 or 20 different property owners, all of whom ran for the board out of a sincere desire to make our community a better place for all of us to live. Any time that a decision was made to try to improve the conditions here at the lake, those decisions were made by a majority of the board members, and all were made with the perceived best interests of the community as a goal. To those of you who choose to blame past boards, or me personally, for the financial status of the lake, that is your prerogative. My only goal, and the goal of the various members that I served with was to address the infrastructure problems crippling our community, and find ways to cure them. I am proud of the accomplishments that were achieved while I was on the board, and will apologize to no one for the decisions that were made by the board during that time, nor for my part in those decisions.

The next TAA meeting will be Thursday, March 11, 2004 at 7:00 P.M. Members will discuss plans for the next bass tournament in April. Dale Farwig and Gary Ryan will report on the aluminum recycling project and the funds available for fish restocking. We will decide at that time what efforts will be made to restock fish.

Tishomingo Anglers Association is a group of concerned fishermen and lake residents who want to take care of the beautiful lake and its resources.

A reminder: The best thing we can do as lake residents to protect our resource is to stop anyone who does not belong on the lake. Get their license plate number and report them to the police if they are trespassing. Also, please give the license plate number to Gary Ryan.

The next most important thing we can do to improve the lake is to follow and enforce the restricted slot limit on largemouth bass. All anglers should release ALL bass larger than 14 inches. You may harvest up to 6 fish per day per person under 14 inches; however, to ensure the success of the fishery, release the larger fish for spawning success and to help create a trophy fishery.

If you catch a trophy fish, measure it, release it, and get a fiberglass reproduction made if you want a mount. Fiberglass reproductions are as realistic and beautiful as skin mounts, they cost the same, and they last forever. Skin mounts deteriorate in a short decade and they later smell from the fish oils. There is really no reason to keep fish over 14 inches when we have an abundant supply of 10-13.99 inch fish for harvesting and eating. We also have an abundant supply of grass carp, catfish, bluegill, and green sunfish, which are all excellent eating.

Report on Christmas Tree Project

In January, 8 or 9 Christmas trees were collected and anchored in the lake in 8-12 feet of water for minnow and other fish habitat. Please recycle your trees again next year. Although they provide a great habitat and cover for fish, these trees deteriorate in just a few years and have to be replaced. Thanks!

Engelman, a fellow lake resident. It was completed in 1963. There was only one other house in A-cove at the time and few other full time residents at the lake.

Over the years some things have changed a great deal. For instance:

The well pump was an oasis where one could get a fresh cold drink of water on a hot day.

The roads were chip and gravel which were oiled and chipped each summer by resident volunteers. There were far fewer items of trash tossed from car windows.

The community house was built by volunteers in the early '60s. Each summer there was a two-day picnic at which a new Ford was raffled off.

Our lake water was extremely clear, I remember treading water and seeing the pink polish on my toe nails.

The telephones were on party lines. Our ring was 2 longs. If you wanted to catch up on the local news those phones made it easy!

Goldman fire department was a all volunteer department. You had to purchase a small metal medallion to post on your house each year. If you did not have the medallion the department would not respond.

The closest place to buy bread and milk was 30 minutes away.

It was common to see flying squirrels soar from one tree to another in the evening.

Our electric service was interrupted so often we joked that there was one long extension cord serving the lake and it got kicked loose far too often.

Livestock from farms nearby have often wandered through our yard. Cows, horses, chickens, pigs, goats, turkeys and once a peacock have visited us. Some stayed for a few minutes, sone a few hours, the peacock hung around for days.

When the lights were turned out at night it was total darkness. You couldn't see your hand in front of your face. The starts were so bright and there seemed to be so many of them. Some things remain the same:

Wild Sides

recipe, a variation on an old favorite, lasagna, is no exception.

Dixie Bryant's White Lasagna

- 2 c. cooked chicken (diced)
- 2 jars (16 oz. each) Alfredo pasta sauce
- 1/2 c. chopped roasted red bell peppers (optional)
- 1 medium onion, chopped (1/2 c.)

1 clove garlic, finely chopped

3 T chopped fresh parsley

8 uncooked lasagna noodles (from 16-oz. package)

1 container (15 oz.) ricotta cheese or small curd creamed cottage cheese (2 c.)

1/2 c. grated Parmesan cheese

1 T chopped fresh or 11/2 teaspoons dried oregano leaves

2 c. shredded mozzarella cheese (8 oz.)

Saute onion and garlic. Stir in chicken, 2 T of the parsley, optional red peppers, and the Alfredo sauce. Heat to boiling, stirring occasionally; reduce heat.

Heat oven to 350 deg. Cook and drain noodles as directed on package. (Or, use precooked noodles.)

While noodles are cooking, mix ricotta cheese, 1/4 c. of the Parmesan cheese, the oregano and remaining parsley.

Spread half of the meat mixture in ungreased rectangular baking dish (13x9x2 inches). Top with four noodles. Spread half of the cheese mixture over noodles. Sprinkle with 1 c. of the mozzarella cheese. Repeat layers, ending with mozzarella. Sprinkle with remaining 1/4 c. Parmesan cheese.

Cover and bake 30 minutes. Uncover and bake about 15 minutes longer or until hot and bubbly. Let stand 15 minutes before cutting. 8 servings.

Let's end with a healthy desert — Lou Harting's banana nut cake. What makes this desert healthy? The bananas. My father lived to be 93 and for the last 30 years of his life ate one banana a day as an afternoon snack. While Lou is best known for his deviled eggs, he also is a master of the banana nut cake.

Lou Harting's Banana Nut Cake

2-1/4 c cake flour 1-2/3 c sugar 1-1/4 t baking powder 1-1/4 t baking soda 1 t salt 2/3 c shortening (oil) 2/3 c milk 3 eggs 1-1/4 c mashed ripe bananas 2/3 c finely chopped nuts

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 9" x 13" baking pan or two 9-inch or three 8-inch round layer pans. Measure all ingredients into large mixer bowl. Blend 30 seconds on low speed, scrape bowl constantly. Beat three minutes high speed, scraping bowl occasionally. Pour into pans.

Bake oblong pan for 45 to 50 minutes, layers for 35 to 40 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool.

Since the lake seems to be "blessed" with Canada Geese this winter, a neighbor suggested we offer ways to cook geese or side dishes that accompany geese. The first recipe served up today comes from Gail Lents and could very well be served with goose, although probably not Canada Goose, since we think harvesting Canada Geese is illegal. Gail's dish features both wild rice and brown rice. Contrary to what many believe, wild rice is not rice at all but a grass. Much of it sold in the world today is not even wild but rather cultivated varieties that do not occur naturally. Wild rice is really an annual aquatic seed Zizania aquatica found mostly in the upper freshwater lakes of Canada, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Minnesota in North America.

Gail Lents' Twice the Rice Casserole

1 c wild rice 1 c brown rice 1 c currants or raisins 1/2 c pine nuts or walnuts, toasted 1/4 c chopped fresh parsley or 1/8 c dried parsley 1/4 c olive oil 2 T grated orange zest 2 T orange juice grated parmesan cheese salt and pepper to taste

Bring 3 cups of water to boil in a medium size heavy saucepan. Add wild rice, stir, and reduce heat. Cover and simmer rice for 35 minutes. Drain rice and transfer to large bowl.

Bring 2 cups of water to boil in heavy sauce pan. Add brown rice, stir, and reduce heat. Cover pan and simmer 20 minutes. The water should be totally absorbed and rice tender.

Combine cooked wild and brown rices. Add remaining ingredients except cheese. Toss everything together to combine. Transfer mixture to an ovenproof casserole, cover tightly with aluminum foil. Bake until rices are soft but not mushy about 20 to 30 minutes. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese, return to oven to brown the cheese a little bit. Serves 12-15 people.

Our next recipe comes from Kathy Hopfer and received rave reviews when served at the LTIA dinner meeting in January.

Kathy Hopfer's Broccoli Salad

1 bunch broccoli, chopped 1/2 c sun flower seeds or sliced almonds 1/2 c raisins 8 slices bacon, cooked, chopped 1/2 red onion, chopped 1/2 c mayonnaise 3 T cider vinegar 1/2 c sugar

Combine all ingredients. Mix well and let set for at least one hour.




