Our Lake Is Building continues from prior column

Our real estate values have increased steadily. At the same time, we have maintained our charm, tradition, our safety and sense of community. We are thankful for the commitment of increased funding for the lake. This allows us to maintain and improve our common areas of water, roads and land and keeps pace with the millions of dollars being spent privately. The cooperation of our residents following the rules whether on the water, on the roads and/or new building projects is very much appreciated.

The building rules are fairly simple. Any change of a home exterior footprint requires the approval of the LTPOA Board of Directors. Any building on common property around the lake and/or on the lake requires BoD approval. (A 10- to 20-foot-wide ribbon surrounds the entire lake. This area and the lake itself are common lake property). This includes any patios, fences, walls, docks, boat lifts, etc. **It is very important that ALL docks be marked with a lot number and recorded on the property's deed.**

Any new build (including 6×8 ft sheds on vacant lots) requires approval. The approval allows the owner to qualify for a temporary gate code for construction, and alerts the sewer board that new construction is coming. At approval, the BoD then follows along with the Jefferson County inspection and permitting process. The signed building app also protects our community from any road damage by heavy equipment.

OUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS IS VERY SUPPORTIVE OF QUALITY IMPROVEMENTS! We have experienced people who can help navigate the process of construction. The rules that are in place are one of the reasons that the lake has maintained its high value. Please contact us with questions on any and all construction so we are aware of what is happening in the community. We will advise you whether your project requires approval.

work recently: Joann Ross and Rich Hirsch for cutting the tall grasses and cleaning up by the fenced area before the entrance, Gail Lents for cutting the forsythia at the head of the path leading to the spillway, Chyree DeRoode for cleaning up beds around sales office and mini park, and Steve Kottemann for cleaning up leaves, trimming rose bushes and trimming boxwoods in the flag pole area.

First Priority Work that needs to be done by the front entrance by the stop sign:

- Cut and collect tall grasses by Lake Tishomingo signs
- Cut back weeds around both Lake Tishomingo signs

- Turn around area: honeysuckle removal
- Turn around area: leaves and trash cleanup
- Gate area: leaves and trash cleanup
- Bus Shelter: leaves cleanup

Cooking Corner

[Editor's note: Today's recipe is courtesy of Robin McKinnon, winner of the 2019 Lake Tishomingo Chili Cookoff. I retitled the recipe.]

Lake Tishomingo 2019 Championship Chili

- 2 pounds ground chuck
- 1 pound bulk Italian sausage
- 3 (15 oz) cans chili beans, drained
- 1 (15 oz) can chili beans in spicy sauce or black beans
- 2 (28 oz) cans of crushed tomatoes
- 2 (6 oz) cans tomato paste
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 green bell pepper, seeded and chopped
- 1 red bell pepper, seeded and chopped
- 2 cans diced tomatoes with chilies
- 1 tablespoon bacon bits
- 4 cubes beef bouillon
- 1/2 cup beer (drink the rest S)
- 1/4 cup chili powder
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tablespoon minced garlic
- 1 tablespoon dried oregano
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 2 teaspoons tabasco
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon white sugar (or brown sugar)

Brown meats.

Add fresh ingredients and let simmer for about 5 to 10 minutes.

Add all other ingredients.

Bring to a quick boil, then turn heat down to simmer. Cover and simmer for about 3 to 4 hours, stirring occasionally.

For toppings, serve with: Corn chips Shredded cheddar cheese Sour cream

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LTPOA Meeting Minutes

LTPOA Minutes March 10, 2020

Board members present Steve Blaha, Shelby Reneski, Mark Stubits, Jon Riche, Doug Leeker, Mike Steeno

President Steve Blaha called the meeting to order.

President's Report

Steve stated the February minutes have not yet been completed and will be forthcoming.

Treasurer's Report

Shelby read the financial report for March 2020. February had a cash inflow total of \$1,425.89 which included \$1,400 from assessments, \$20.89 from interest and \$5 from gate cards. The cash outflow for February totaled \$2,508.61 which included: Charter (\$69.99), Phone.com (\$18.87), Ameren (\$106.14), Holloran Contracting for material cost on bridge repair (\$784.67), Steve Blaha for flag pole items and buoy stickers (\$210.78) and Happy Grass for 12 hours of plowing, clean up of ramp and spillway and gas (\$1,318.16). The checking account balance was \$174,748.93 as of 02/29/2020. Interest accrued in the Major Projects Fund account in the amount of \$41.81, resulting in a balance of \$117,297.72 as of 02/29/2020. Doug made a motion to approve the treasurer's report and it was seconded by Mike. MOTION PASSED.

Shelby asked for approval to pay March bills totaling \$3,373.39 which included; Charter (\$69.99), Ameren (\$108.10), Phone.com (\$18.87), Happy Grass for 42 hours of brush clearing and tree trimming (\$3,150) and Janet Hirsch for new belts for the gate mechanism (\$26.43). Doug made a motion to approve paying the bills and it was seconded by Mike. MOTION PASSED.

Shelby reported on the 14 individuals who have still not paid their 2019 assessments. Jon made a motion to have Mike contact our attorney in order to send letters to the individuals with outstanding payments and follow up with the liens when necessary and it was seconded by Doug. MOTION PASSED.

Building

Doug reported on an application for lots M34, M35. The application is to remove, replace and extend an existing driveway. Mike made a motion to approve the work on the driveway and it was seconded by Mark. MOTION PASSED.

Another application was reported for lots I27, I28. The project includes drainage, patio, moving a propane tank and installation of new block retaining walls. Jon made a motion to approve the site work as described and it was seconded by Mark. MOTION PASSED.

The owners of lots F14, F15 supplied an application for a 6'x8' shed. The shed will be located on a vacant lot with no residence. Mike made a motion to approve the construction of the shed and it was seconded by Jon. MOTION PASSED.

An application was submitted for lots N20, N21, N22, N23 to rebuild/replace the existing dock. The dock is larger than the allowable size for new docks. Since the dock is existing, it is grandfathered and allowed to be reconstructed to the same dimensions. Doug made a motion to approve the re-construction of the dock to the same dimensions, in the same location and it was seconded by Mark. MOTION PASSED.

An application was submitted for lot K23 (FKA K21, K22, K23) The application is to construct a new 2 car garage with attachment to the home and new driveway. Doug made a motion to approve the project contingent on approval from Jefferson County and it was seconded by Jon. MOTION PASSED.

Security

No report

Gate

Rich reported the most used code in February was UPS at 1.9 times per day. There were additional instances of non-UPS vehicles using the UPS code. Mark and Rich agreed they would contact UPS and issue them a new code.

There was a gate outage in mid February when the gate arm would not completely open. The belt in the mechanism was replaced with a power twist belt which corrected the problem.

Maintenance

Old Business

Holloran Contracting has completed the work around the inlet tube. The area has been viewed after recent rains and the water is now flowing more directly and uninterrupted into the tube. This will greatly diminish any erosion under and around the inlet tube under the bridge.

New Business

Janet reported on the algae seen in the lake recently. Much of the algae has been growing along the sea walls. The growth is primarily is due to the lack of extremely cold temperatures. The algae is a type of spirogyra and is not harmful. When warm weather begins, the algae will turn brown, die off and recede.

Steve thanked Ken Jost for his many years of handing out gate cards as well as many other efforts. Dale and Robin McKinnon have volunteered to take over this responsibility and we thank them very much for doing so. Steve reported on some drainage and drain pipe situations and water infiltration into the sales office. Steve is in the process of obtaining bids to correct these issues.

Jon made a motion to adjourn and it was seconded by Mike. MOTION PASSED.

Meeting adjourned at 7:43 pm.

III. BOAT & MOTOR IDENTIFICATION

1. All boats must be registered with the LTPOA and must be the property of a lot owner.

2. Registration stickers will be furnished for those boats in compliance with the LTPOA Boat Registration Rules and Regulations. Stickers must be placed on the left (port) side of the craft near the block and lot identification.

3. Boats of all types must have the owner's lot and block number placed on each side of the craft in letters not less than three (3) inches in height. Placement should be toward the front of the boat if possible.

NatureNews

Editor's Note: A couple of months ago, Steve Blaha submitted the topic of this column, noting that a saddleback caterpillar was "found on a banana plant leaf here at the lake." And that "Linda can attest to the unpleasant sting." Ouch!

Saddleback Caterpillar

Scientific name: Acharia stimulea

(Insecta: Lepidoptera: Limacodidae)

Identification: This caterpillar has a truncated, slug-like body, about an inch long, primarily green with brown at either end. Note the fleshy horns at either end, covered with spines. These spines as well as the smaller ones projecting from the sides of the body are hollow and connected to poison glands.

Danger: Contacting the poisonous spines can be as painful as a bee sting. The skin reddens and swells. The spines may embed themselves into the skin and break off. Embedded spines should be removed as soon as possible. Try putting adhesive or other tape on the area, then pulling it off; repeat with a fresh piece of tape until the area seems clear. Then wash well with soap and water, and apply ice to lessen the pain.

Hosts: Many plants, including apple, asters, blueberries, citrus, corn, dogwoods, elms, grapes, linden, maples, oaks, Prunus species, sunflowers, and viburnums.

Range: Massachusetts to Florida, west to eastern Missouri and Texas.

Ken Lanning obituary by Janet Hirsch

Long-time Lake resident Ken Lanning died peacefully in his sleep overnight March 1, 2020.

Ken came to Lake Tishomingo in the 1960s and lived in Tishomingo Forest for many years. He owned 17 lots within Lake Tishomingo—that's more than any other property owner. Ken served as Building Director on the LTPOA board and also helped the LTIA with maintenance of the Community House. In recent years, he retired to Oklahoma, sold all of his Lake Tish property, and lived with family. He was 88 years old.

There will be a memorial service later this year.

WATER ACTIVITIES RULES AND REGULATIONS

(Revised 2019 By LTPOA Board)

I. FISHING

 Fishermen must be accompanied by a lot owner except by special arrangements made with the lake patrol.
Fish may be taken using a rod or pole. Only three rods or poles per person are allowed, and there is a three-hook limit on each rod or pole.

3. Trotlines and jugs are prohibited.

4. The maximum number/quantity of fish per take, creel, catch or possession shall be according to the Tishomingo Anglers Association's current recommendations in accordance with the continuing effort to improve and modify each species and their population. These regulations are formulated after consulting our local fisheries biologist.

II. PATROL BOAT

1. The LTPOA patrol boat operator is responsible for water safety and enforcement of Water Activities Rules and Regulations and Boat Registration and Regulations.

2. The patrol boat will be operated in a safe and courteous manner and has the right-of-way on the lake at all times.

III. BOAT & MOTOR IDENTIFICATION

1. All boats must be registered with the LTPOA and must be the property of a lot owner.

Registration stickers will be furnished for those boats in compliance with the LTPOA Boat Registration Rules and Regulations. Stickers must be placed on the left (port) side of the craft near the block and lot identification.
Boats of all types must have the owner's lot and block number placed on each side of the craft in letters not less than three (3) inches in height. Placement should be toward the front of the boat if possible.

IV. BOATS - All boaters must be in compliance with Missouri State Rules and Regulations

1. The maximum boat length allowed is seventeen (17) feet excluding pontoon boats.

2. No boat shall be overloaded beyond the OBC rated capacity, or have a motor that exceeds the OBC maximum rating.

3. No hydroplanes, jet skis, inboard motor, or air boats (swamp buggies) are allowed. All outboard motors must be propelled by a marine propeller, NO jet drives are allowed.

4. Overnight parking of boats, vehicles or trailers on ANY community property without written permission is prohibited.

V. PONTOON BOATS

1. Pontoon boats cannot exceed 24 feet in length.

2. No such type of craft shall be permitted unless the owner has a residence at Lake Tishomingo.

3. No such craft shall have any temporary or permanent sleeping, cooking, sanitary or toilet facilities thereon. No enclosing or screening of craft.

4. Pontoon boats are restricted to "No Wake" (a very slow speed whereby the wake or wash created by the vessel would be minimal).

VI. MOTORS

1. No craft shall have attached a motor which exceeds a total of forty (40) horsepower.

VII. MOTOR BOATING

1. From 10.00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. (prevailing time), maximum speed allowed.

2. From 7:00 p.m. until 10:00 a.m., all crafts shall be restricted to "No Wake" (a very slow speed whereby the

wake or wash created by the vessel would be minimal). 3. During ski hours all boats are to maintain a marine pattern of counter-clockwise travel.

 Zigzagging, facing toward the stern while operating boat, reckless speed, operating craft while intoxicated and any other form of careless or reckless operation is prohibited.
Minimum clearance of freeboard from gunwale to the surface of the water while operating shall be six (6) inches for any craft.

6. Every craft must be equipped with an approved type of life preserver for each person aboard.

7. Boats operating after dark must be properly lighted.

8. All boating must be at least 100 feet from shore.

9. Right-of-way shall be in the following order: sailboats, row boats, canoes, pontoons.

10. No boats are to enter swimming area under any circumstances.

11. Reduce speed of all craft while in coves or launch area to "No Wake" (a very slow speed whereby the wake or wash created by the vessel would be minimal)

12. If you see or think that anyone is in distress, make effort to help and notify patrol boat.

VIII. SKI AND SURFBOARD SAFETY

1. Skiing or surfboarding is permitted from 10:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. (prevailing time).

2. Skier must wear an approved lifesaving belt or jacket at all times.

Keep boat and skier 100 feet from shore while operating.
All boats when pulling skiers must either be equipped

with a rearview mirror or have at least two occupants. 5. Travel counterclockwise at all times and circle counter clockwise when picking up a fallen skier.

6. Never drive boat so that skier is closer than 50 feet from any object.

7. Take signal from skier only and never sit on gunwale of boat.

8. Operators of boats pulling skiers must be at least sixteen (16) years of age.

9. Skiing from cove entrance is not permitted. Skiing should start and end up on the main body of the lake.

IX. SCUBA DIVING

 Any property owner or guest scuba diving must have card signifying accredited course in techniques of diving.
Report to the patrol approximate area where you intend to dive from.

3. Display diver flag on float or boat and stay within 100 feet of same. Boats and skiers to keep 150 feet from flag. Remove flag after dive.

4. No scuba diving in ski lanes except when search and rescue diving is being conducted.

5. Fish and game Laws must be observed by divers. **X. SWIMMING**

X. SWIMMING

1. All swimmers must stay within fifty (50) feet of the shoreline except as noted below.

2. Swimming from pontoon boats is permitted (for short periods of time) in the lane between swimming, 50 feet from shoreline, and the ski lanes, 100 feet from shoreline.

XI. BUOYS

1. No buoys/tethered objects may be used in Lake Tishomingo without LTPOA approval.

XII. RESPONSIBILITY

1. Lot owners will be held responsible for the actions of their guests.
